Furthermore, the Director of the VMC, George Lelakis who has been instrumental to our grant application, has resigned with the change of the State Government.

We are currently waiting for further advice before proceeding with any further developments.

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CAV CHINESE SCHOOL



Greetings to all teachers. students, parents, friends of the CAV Chinese School and members & friends of the CAV. Welcome to the new beginning of the Year of Rabbit. As befitting to the rabbit's busy character of hopping about, working all day every day, some of us have caught the 'rabbit fever' already. The school now has a brand new storeroom to store lots of equipment and other things which

have crowded my office for the past two years. I would like to express my heartfelt thanks to Fui Keong Yong, Greg Matulich and Robert Labberton for constructing the storeroom. (not forgetting the spouses who kindly allowed their men to spend the whole day at the school, perhaps, instead of helping with their own housework! Thanks,

ladies!) The three men, with the help of Dr Kasing Chua and myself; worked from





10.00 in the morning to ~11.00 p.m at night. Fui Keong calculated and bought the material needed for the project prior to the

commencement of the construction. Words cannot adequately express the generosity of these three men (and their spouses), especially Robert who is not a parent from the School.



CAV School has been lucky to have so many parents and friends helping us out whenever help is needed. Our school canteen, staffed by parents and friends, provides hot food for students during the recess. It also helps to raise fund to buy equipment for the school. To date, the canteen has helped to buy computers, projector, a portable keyboard, an erhu, etc. Much appreciation goes to all who have helped in the canteen. The musical instruments purchased help to expand our excellent School Orchestra. Apart from these extra musical instruments, the School now has a genuine Chinese drum, kindly donated by the Chinese Consulate General in Melbourne. My special thanks to Consul Chen Di for his help in getting us the drum. The School Orchestra will add the drum to its repertoire. On Saturday 5th March, the School Orchestra will play at the Knox Festival. Everyone is welcome to go and see and hear them at the festival.

This year, the school students have an extra area, the new courtyard, for activities on Sundays. Special thanks go to the CAV Vice president, Rex Lai, who has the responsibility to oversee the construction of the courtyard. He is planning to have an outdoor stage built to facilitate the school's cultural activities.

In the past two years, the president Lillian Lai, and the vice presidents Rex Lai and Shirley Teh, together with committee member Evelyn Han, have helped the School in many constructive and positive ways. Like me, these people are task-orientated, and together with the School council's help, the School has seen many valuable improvements.

Since the start of this school year, every Sunday parents have been coming to enroll their children in our school. It has been a very busy three weeks. We welcome two new teachers who replace the two teachers who have retired, and Teacher Leng Lee who is our new Casual Relief Teacher.

CURRICULUM

As announced last year, this year the school curriculum will be streamlined to cater for the students whose parents want them to be acquainted with the Chinese language and culture, but not necessarily wanting to sit for the VCE exam. Classes will be reorganised according to students' abilities, not their age. As such, the School will be phasing out the year level, and we will be using the classes names, that is, tu zi, fei ma, Zhongguo long, Kongzi, Libai, Tangtaizong, (兔子,飞马, 中国龙, 孔子, 李白,唐太 宗) etc. to more accurately described the various classes, because year levels by age do not reflect the students' Chinese Language levels. Homework will be set with range from minimum requirement to optional extra. There will be more class activities including stories of Chinese history, philosophy, legends, the arts, festivals, etc. Students will be tested for their understanding of the above, as well as the language levels.

One aspect of the curriculum will be excursions to the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) Asian Art

Gallery. This year, the date for the excursion will be 10.00a.m. Sunday 27th March, 2011, to coincide with the NGV's celebration of the Cultural Diversity Week. NGV is also celebrating its 150th year of establishment, its Asian art collection started 149 years ago, in 1862. Chinese has been a part of Victoria since the gold rush days. In many aspects, our predecessors were very much part of the local scene. As the Victorian Premier, Ted Bailieu, has said at one of the Chinese Consulate receptions, the Chinese even had a football club called the Bendigo Chinese Football Club (BCFC) all those years ago, and it did very well in matches against the other football clubs! Football aside, the NGV has an excellent collection of Asian art, predominantly Chinese art, on display. There will be three Mandarin tours, on Wed 23 Feb, Sat 26 Feb and Sun 27 Feb, at 11.30a.m. Entry to NGV is free; this is a good opportunity for all those parents, grandparents and relatives who do not speak English, to go and appreciate Chinese art.

CHINESE NEW YEAR CELEBRATION

As in the past, the first cultural activity of the year is the Chinese New Year celebration. This year, the president, Lillian Lai, has kindly organised the hongbao (red packets) and lolly bags for the students, and a lion dance for the celebration. Prior to the event, all classes had lessons about the celebration, the story of the Nian, legends, and activities associated with the Chinese New Year. Younger students went to the hall earlier to play games while the older students joined the others in the hall, just before the lion dance. The traditional Lion Dance was performed by two lions which went through the ritual celebratory sequence of movements, to the thunderous drum beats. Children and adults gave hongbao to the lions as they danced around the hall to bestow good luck to all present. Following the lion dance, much to the delight of all, each child at the hall was given a hongbao by the 'elders' of CAV.

First of all, a very warm welcome to everyone for the 2011 school year, especially to all new students, scholars and families. We hope that you have all had a fantastic summer break and are excited for a brand new year ahead.

To all newcomers, allow us to take this opportunity to introduce to you the CAV School Canteen, its role and the people behind it.

Located at the CAV main building, the canteen is run by a small group of dedicated parents who voluntarily devote their free time on Sundays to prepare meals for the school's attendees.

Let us give you an insight on the going-ons of a typical day at the CAV School Canteen. Our 'chefs' and comrades gather at the school canteen from as early as 9:30 am on Sundays, all geared up to cook up a storm. After some guick coordination, the harmony of knives on chopping boards and clanking of frying pans takes place, creating a beehive of activity in the canteen; this follows with a wafting aroma of freshly cooked food, reminding the kids it's almost break time. Just like Battle of the Chefs, our aim is to present fares which are nutritional yet appealing at a reasonable price (believe me, it's not easy!) to fascinate and tickle the taste buds of our most discerning customers - the kids! Most of the time, cooking is done out of experience, other times out of imagination and sometimes, well, experiment! At 11 am which is the school recess time, the canteen is open for counter sales; and that is when we all watch in anticipation, the nods of approval from our judges (the kids!) as they tuck into their food - definitely the most rewarding part of the day! After recess time, a round of cleaning and housekeeping of the Canteen follows. Apart from sales during recess times, the canteen also extends its hours of operation during the school's special events or functions for everyone's benefit and enjoyment.

Among the many mouth-watering dishes that have been on last year's menu was the canteen-made fried rice, curry

puffs and cupcakes which were rather popular with the children. This year, we hope to add more variety and flavour to the menu such as dumplings and noodles to name a few, to cater to everyone's palate.

A significant part of the Canteen team's role is also fund raising, and this is done by channeling back all proceeds from the sale of the food to the school to purchase much needed facilities such as laptops, projectors, speakers and books. So far, the combined effort has been very successful in 2010 and we hope to accomplish more in 2011.

Since the last newsletter update, much has taken place; the highlight to the year end was the BBQ and Christmas Celebration in December 2010 to mark the closing of the school year and to celebrate Christmas in advance. This simple yet fun celebration was organised by the Canteen team and was complimentary to all students and staff. Sausages and drinks were aplenty, and on a hot summer day, a specially prepared strawberry fruit punch proved to be a hit amongst everyone, especially the kids!

Many more activities will be organised this year, so we urge parents to join us as a volunteer and have some fun contributing to the success of the school and the children's education at CAV. How I Started to Learn Mandarin and Fell in Love with Classical Chinese Poetry

It all began several years ago when I had *shingles*. As it was a condition that was infectious, I was advised to stay home. I was home alone. Not sick enough to be in bed and not well enough to venture out, I was looking for something to read when I chanced upon a Mandarin language pack consisting of a text manual and an audio tape. I must have bought the pack in one of my visits to Malaysia and had long forgotten about it. Born of Chinese parents and having received an education in Malaysia where English was then the predominant medium of instruction, I had always been interested in the Mandarin language, but had neither the time nor the commitment to learn the language. My interest in the language was confined to Chinese songs to which I listened occasionally without any understanding of the lyrics.

That day, something prompted me to place the tape into an old tape-player and to open the companion book. Practically everything in the book and the tape was strange to me. I had listened to not more than a couple of minutes of the tape when I said to myself, "I can do this. I can learn Mandarin and this is as good a time as any to start!" There and then, with pencil and a used envelope in hand, I tried to write whatever characters I could recognize from my youth. They were limited to the numbers "one" to "ten" and a character which I was attracted to, only for its simplicity and its symmetry. The

word was "中" (meaning "middle" in Chinese). That was the start of my journey into the wonderful world of Chinese language and culture. From that day on I never looked back and I have not stopped. I was sixty-three years old.

Not long after that, after a Sunday round of golf and lunch at Box Hill Central, a friend and I were passing by a book vendor's stand selling Chinese books and CDs/DVDs. I could not read any of the titles of the material on display but two books with glossy covers caught my attention. The contents of the book were short passages complete with Hanyu pinyin above each character and simple illustrations in colour adjacent to the text. I could not resist buying the books, paying \$8.00 for each. My rationale then was that in time I hoped to be able to make some sense of their contents. After the purchase, my Chinese-educated companion, without revealing what the books were about, remarked that "if and when you are able to read and understand what's in those books; you would be fairly learned (in Mandarin)".

It was several days later that I worked out, with the help of a Chinese dictionary, that the two volumes were "唐诗三百 shōu sòng cí sān bǎi shǒu

首"("300 Poems of the Tang Dynasty") and "宋词三百首" ("300 Poems of the Song Dynasty"). With tongue in cheek, I tried, again with the help of a Chinese dictionary, to see if I could understand the first of the 300 Song poems. Painstakingly working through the poem, it suddenly struck me that the sounds represented by the pinyin in the poem were vaguely familiar. Where have I heard these sounds before? Could they be the lyrics of one of the Mandarin songs I had been listening to frequently of late? With great excitement I picked out and played a song from a CD by Teresa Teng and voila, Io and behold, the lyrics of the song were exactly the words of the poem. The title of the song was

"几多愁?" and the poem is called "虞美人".

How bizarre! What a coincidence! What joy! I could not contain my excitement. At this early stage in my quest to learn the Mandarin language, this was equivalent to striking gold. Here was this famous Teresa Teng singing a song the lyrics of which were from an equally famous poem written more than 1,000 years ago. Later research revealed that the poem was composed by a ruler of a minor kingdom in Northern Song who was better known for his poetry than his kingship. His name was Li Yu (李煜), (a.k.a. Li Houzhu (李後主)).

This was my introduction to the fascinating and enchanting world of classical Chinese poetry. I was hooked. I didn't stop there. Wild horses could not stop me now from going further. If an ancient classical poem such as this could be turned into a modern-day, yet delectable musical number, could there be more poems of that or similar period by the same poet or others that might perhaps be performed by Teresa Teng (or others)?

Indeed there were and, in due course, through repeated playing of Teresa Teng's CDs and much page-thumbing through the two volumes of poetry, I uncovered the following additional eight poems, all exquisitely rendered in song by Teresa Teng and all, in my mind, musical gems in their own right.:

will most certainly be enjoying the scenery along the way 欣赏沿途美丽的景色。

Conclusion

You would not in the normal course of events give credit to a viral condition for putting you on a language path, but, but for shingles, the Mandarin language manual would have stayed on the shelf unopened and its companion audio tape would have remained silent and unheard; the "300 Poems of the Tang Dynasty" and the "300 Poems of the Song Dynasty" (now my priceless treasures) would not be gracing my bookshelves today. But for Teresa Teng, names like Li Yu, Su Dongpo, Ou Yangxiu and Li Bai would have meant very little to me.

As Kylie Minogue would say, "I should be so lucky!"



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
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Windows on Chinese Culture

Chinese New Year

Although celebrations of the Chinese New Year are now over for 2011, I thought some readers might be interested to revisit the story behind those traditions.

Chinese New Year is the most significant festival in the Lunar calendar. This year is the Year of the Rabbit (兔) which starts from Feb 3 of 2011 and celebrations conclude on the 15^{th} day, marked by the Yuanxiao festival (元宵节). People born in the year of the Rabbit are said to have some or all of the following attributes: Gracious, friendly, kind, sensitive, soft-spoken, amiable, elegant, reserved, cautious, artistic, thorough, tender, self-assured, astute, compassionate, and flexible.

The Festival has evolved through thousands of years and has a series of colourful folklores and traditions.

During the New Year celebrations, new clothes would be worn, often red in colour as it is the colour of good luck. Lion dances are common scenes on the streets, at residences and business premises. It is believed that the dancing lion, the loud beats of the drum and the deafening sounds of the cymbals can drive off bad spirits. There are many traditions that can differ according to local practices. Because of space constraint in this newsletter, only a few will be described below.

Reunion dinner (团圆饭)

The most important event is the family reunion dinner. Whether or not public holidays are declared for Chinese New Year, people would take a break from whatever they are doing, and converge from wherever they are, to unite with their families and friends. It is a time to reflect on how people behaved and what they believed in.

A sumptuous dinner is shared that traditionally includes elaborately prepared chicken and meat dishes. Fish is always included but not consumed completely. A portion is kept for the next day (New Year day). This is because the character for fish (yu, $\underline{\oplus}$) is the homonym of the character ($\hat{\pi}$) which means surplus. Leaving part of the fish for New Year day symbolizes having surplus every year ($\underline{\mp}$ 年有余).

After dinner family members gather around and talk all night to catch up on what each has been doing during the year and to welcome in the New Year. This is known as shou sui (守岁). To older members of the family "shou sui" is bidding farewell to a year just gone by, as they treasure precious time. It is believed that when younger members of the family "shou sui" it can bestow longevity to their parents.

The story of Chinese New Year

According to folklore, the New Year festival celebrates the safe passage of a critical time of the year (过年). It was believed that every New Year eve, a ferocious beast called "nian" (年) roamed the earth at night and devours live stocks, and even people. People used to leave food outside their houses hoping their lives may be spared. They later found that this animal was scared of bright light, red colour and loud noises. In order to keep nian away, people would paste red-paper couplets on doors, lit torches, create loud noises throughout the night, setting off explosions by heating sections of bamboo in fire (爆竹) which was later replaced by fire crackers. That is why from the morning of New Year day, the first thing people say when they meet is "gongxi" (恭喜) or "congratulations" - for surviving the ferocious nian!

Preparations before New Year

In many households there is a statue or picture of the Kitchen God, the recorder of family functions. He watches over the family's transgressions and good deeds throughout the year. One week before the New Year, families perform a ritual to send their Kitchen God on a journey to pay respect and report on household affairs to the Jade Emperor (玉皇大帝), the

supreme Taoist deity. According to tradition, households honour these gods by burning ritualistic paper money to provide for their travel expenses (祭 灶). Another ritual is to smear malt sugar on the lips of the Kitchen God in the hope that he either submits a favourable report to the Jade Emperor or keeps his mouth shut!

Another tradition before New Year is to have a thorough Spring clean (扫尘), to ensure that bad spirits and bad luck of the past year are swept out of the house to make way for good fortunes of the New Year. Brooms are then stored away and there will be no sweeping of the house in the first few days of the New Year, in case good luck is swept out of the house.



Having done the Spring cleaning, it is customary to display posters of the character 福 (fu) This sign is sometimes seen hanging upside down, since the Chinese word 倒 (dao), or "upside down" is the homonym of the word 到 or "arrive". Therefore, it symbolizes the arrival of good luck, happiness, and prosperity. However, some people believe this sign should not be

hung upside down in the main halls and should only be displayed upside down on buckets and rubbish bins. This is because when contents are tipped out of these vessels the word "fu" would be the right way up.

New Year visits (拜年)

Early in the morning of the New Year day, children greet their parents by wishing them a healthy and happy new year. In return they each receive a red packet (hongbao 红包) containg varying amount of money which should be of even numbers. Red packet is also known as "lai see" (利是), in Cantonese or 'ang pow' in Hokkien, or "fung bao" in Hakka. This "hongbao" is traditionally called "yasui qian" (压岁钱) which sounds the same as (压祟钱) which literallymeans "money that suppresses the evil spirit".

In the following few days while visiting relatives and friends it is customary to bring along New Year cake (niangao 年糕) which sounds like (年高) -meaning a more prosperous year, and mandarin (ju zi 橘子) which are both symbols of good luck (吉利).

Common man's birthday (renri 人日)

Another interesting day is the seventh day of the New Year. This is traditionally known as the common man's birthday (renri $\Lambda \square$). On this day it is traditional to toss raw fish salad, <u>yusheng</u> (鱼生) at dinner. While tossing the colourful salad people would make wishes for continued wealth and prosperity as the words yu (鱼) and sheng (生) mean surplus and vitality. The salad therefore represents new life and prosperity. Tossing yusheng is a custom primarily practiced by people in Southeast Asia.

The New Year celebrations conclude on the 15^{th} day. On this day family members gather to eat tangyuan ($\overline{\beta}$, a sweet rice ball soup. This day is celebrated as the <u>Lantern Festival</u>, which has another story. Children would walk the streets carrying lighted lanterns of all shapes and sizes and have a great time.

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
