

It's Term 4 already! How time flies! It is nearly the end of my second year back to CAV School! It has been a fruitful year and a half; much has been achieved thanks to the collaborative effort of the students, parents, teachers, members of the School Council, members of the CAV Executive Committee, and friends, grandparents, as well as some members of our local

community. My sincere and heart-felt thanks to one and all for all your help, all effort big or small, every bit of help count, is very much appreciated. The outcome of your help is obvious: the school has prospered, parents have returned to help, many commented about the change in the atmosphere in and around the school on Sundays. An atmosphere of "homeliness and friendliness" as one mother put it.

- Parent-teacher interview To make more effective use of time, parent-teacher interviews have been rescheduled Sunday 29 November, 2009.
- 4) Presentation Day and free lunch On the last day of term, 6th December, there will be our usual presentation of awards to students for achievement in various categories. An oral presentation by each class will precede the awards which will be followed by a sit-down, free lunch for all students. Parents, grand-parents, other family members, members and friends of C.A.V. are welcome to come along, however, if you wish to have lunch with the students, you need to pre-order lunch (at \$5.00 per serve) at the School Office. This year, it has been decided that lunch will only be served after the conclusion of the presentation program.

A milestone!! The CAV School has again been accredited to teach VCE Chinese Second Language & Chinese Second Language Advanced. Our school is now one of the very few schools which has a long history of accreditation to teach VCE Chinese, to be exact, 25 years since 1984. It is an achievement that students, teachers (past and present), parents, school, CAV and the local communities can be proud of. It is indeed a milestone for the CAV School, established in 1982.

In Term 4, please remember the following:

- Hats once again, students are reminded that hats have to be worn if they wish to go outside to the playground during recess time. Students who do not have hats are advised to stay in the covered area, and not to go under the sun, in case of UV radiation and sunburn.
- 2) Year 2010 RE-ENROLMENT & NEW ENROLMENT Bai Laoshi is now ready to reenroll current students and enroll new students for 2009. Re-enrolment forms have been handed out to students on Sunday 25th October. A \$20.00 discount will be given to all enrolments paid up on or before the last day of Term 4, 6th December, 2009.
- New Curriculum for next year, 2010 & Briefing on School Charter and the new curriculum - I am in the process of re-organising our school curriculum. As many of you may recall, when I took over the management of our school, there was no cohesive sequence to curriculum in many year levels. Now I am happy to say that all teachers are working in the 'correct' level for each class, with sequence and continuity from one year level to the next being tailored to be more cohesive. With the coming year, our school will be adopting a curriculum more in line with the Victorian Essential Learning Standards set by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA). During Term 4, arrangement will be made for parents of students from each year level to attend a briefing on our school charter and the new curriculum. It is very important for each parent to attend this briefing, as parents are very much part of the equation in students learning.

Martin Chiew was one such competitor. He represented Australia in Table Tennis at the Gold Coast Games in August and came home with Runner-Up Medals in both Singles and Doubles in the 50-59 Division.

A Dictionary of CAV Table Tennis (CAVTT)

In this our third instalment we feature a world champion, the use of glue and when to say 'Sorry'.

Wang Hao (王 皓)

The number of times you hear this name mentioned, you'd think he lives among us (CAVTT paddlers). The truth is, the real Wang Hao is a 25-year old chubby-faced World No.1 table tennis champion from Changchun in North East China. As a member of the men's 2008 Olympic Gold Medal winning team which included Ma Ling (马林)and Wang Liqin (玉励勤)(China's other table tennis superstars), he is China's table tennis national hero, much admired and envied the world over (and hero-worshipped at CAVTT) for his mastery over the revolutionary reverse backhand loop drive. Some at CAVTT cannot have enough of him. A few think they play like him. Others would give their left/right arm to be able to play like him. (Dream on, lads!).

[P.S. In four straight games, in the final of the Men's Singles event at the H.I.S. World Championships on 5th May 2009 in the Japanese city of Yokohama, Wang Hao was crowned World champion, beating the defending champion and colleague, Wang Liqin, 11-9, 13-11, 11-5, 11-9.]

At CAVTT, so much "gao" or glue is used you think it is being sniffed rather than used to put a sheet of rubber and a bat together. 不笑 "(literally "skin smiles, flesh not smile")?

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
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CAV Honorary Fellowship Nomination Form

<u>Trip to Beijing –</u> <u>Celebration of the 60th National Day of</u> the People's Republic of China

I was most surprised when I received the invitation from the Consulate-General of the People's Republic of China in Melbourne to attend the celebration of the 60th Anniversary of the founding on the PRC. This was mid-September. It was busy time of the year and I considered declining the invitation. When I learnt that there were only 10 invitees from Melbourne, I felt that it was a great honor to be on the invitation list so I accepted. So it was a bit of a rush to get the ticket and visa organized. The visa was the easy part. The flight arrangements were a bit more difficult. It seemed that everyone wanted to go to China for the 60th Anniversary celebrations.

I managed to obtain the list of invitees from the Consulate-General to try to coordinate flights and arrival times. The other invitees include the presidents of the FCA, the Chinese Masonic Society, the Inner-Mongolian Chinese Association, Cambodian-Chinese Association, South-East Melbourne Elderly Association and others. Due to difficulties in flight arrangements, it was decided to make our own arrangements and meet in Beijing.

I arrived in Beijing on the night of 29th September after along multi-stopover trip. After being picked up at the airport, I met up with some of the other Melbourne invitees and a person from Canada. We, the Australians, Canadians and New Zealanders were in the same hotel. I found out later that there were over 2000 overseas Chinese Community leader were invited from 126 countries and they were scattered around Beijing in various hotels.

The following days were very busy days. The routine was: up early for breakfast at the hotel and into the buses by a fixed time. Then join the other buses for the arranged official visits to places of importance, then back to the hotel for lunch and then out again late in the afternoon for evening arrangements. There were over 90 buses in the convoy for the overseas Chinese invitees, with full Police escort and all other traffic blocked from these routes. Impressive! The problem for the organizers was trying to make sure that everyone got back on the buses they came in as many old friends decided that it was a good idea to sit on another bus with someone they have just met or with someone they have not seen for many years. The counting of persons on each bus took forever on the return trips. Missing the bus could be a big problem as Beijing is a big city.

The itinerary was basically as follows. Tuesday morning was to visit a special exhibition of the 60 years of the PRC's progress in industry, military, agriculture, social and communities, trade, education, infrastructure and many more areas. Being a public exhibition, there were thousands of local people and groups visiting as well. The place was huge and it would take more than 2 hours to view the exhibition properly. I do pity some of the older guests. It was a tiring walk for some.



For lunch, we were taken to the Beijing Official Guest Houses. This was like a huge garden area in the middle of the city. These are the residences for visiting dignitaries to stay during their visits to Beijing. There were over 20 Guest Houses which were very large luxury mansions, surrounded by manicured gardens and parks, including man-made waterfalls. In the middle of all this, there is a very large reception hall. The lunch was an outdoor/indoor set-up, with endless amount of food served buffet style.



There were speeches and official photos but all the groups were trying to have photos taken on the main podium. It was pandemonium. It was an interesting situation to listen to the Chinese guests from Brazil who spoke Portuguese. The lunch was great. Again it was like herding cats to get everyone back on the buses. It was such a beautiful surrounding that many people went for a bit of a wander.

After lunch, it was back to the hotel and a short rest before the evening program. Most people tried to catch a short nap. No time for shopping or sight-seeing.

At 4.10pm, time to get back on the bus. This time to Tian An Men square. Tonight was the official welcome banquet in the Great People's Hall. Getting in was again through very tight security. The arrangement for the Welcome Banquet was very clever. Each person had an official invitation card with a table number and the numbers were randomly distributed so I

was seated at a table with delegates from Brunei, Indonesia, Philippines and Malaysia. There were over 3000 people in the Hall. The military band on the balcony provided music. The delicious food came out in large servings. They made sure that we were not going to be hungry. The official speech was very well received.



After the banquet, the guests were split into two. Some went to cultural performance and others, including us were driven to a showing of the new movie which showed the formation of the People's Republic of China. This documentary-movie was also shown at a special screening in Melbourne. While the story told of the struggle and the



civil war which led to this formation of the PRC, one can also take away the lesson that civil wars usually lead to great loss of lives.

It was a long day and the program for the second day seems to acknowledge that. After breakfast, it was on the buses off to the and Olympic Stadiums the Bird's Nest and the Water Cube. One can see

form the photos that it was difficult o see the sun. A tour of the Stadium and the Swimming stadiums, with tour guides giving a commentary was very good. One thing that many of us were looking forward to was to find our names on the commemorative wall in the Water Cube. Back in 2005-2006, many of us from Melbourne's Chinese Community made donations towards the construction of the Swimming complex. So, after several minutes of searching most people found their names engraved in the wall. When I made that donation several years ago, I had not expected to be actually at the pool seeing my name on the wall. It was a great feeling. There was so much excitement that day.

Thursday morning – the big day has arrived. We had to be up earlier than normal. We had to be on the buses by 7.00am. Off to the national Day Parade. All dress up and smart looking. Due to high security, all the busses were parked in the Forbidden City compound. Then we walked. Everybody walked, Government Officials, Diplomats and us. Each one of us was issued with an entry pass with a seat number at the viewing stands. The walk was not short, with many turns and a couple of security checkpoints.

Once on the seating area, opposite the square, the view was spectacular. The parade started on the dot. The President, Hu Jin Tao in the open car, inspecting the military part of the parade and then back to start the parade. The preparations that went into this must have be huge.. Nothing was going to go wrong. Many of you would have seen the parade live on TV. It was magnificent. The precision of the parade was not just a



display of China's military progress. It was also the display by all the provinces of the country. Each province had a float to show what industries that they are great at and as well as displaying their cultural heritage. It was beautiful and colorful. To describe it here would not be possible. The thousands of people involved and the effort put in is something to be admired. All I can say in summary is this: I have never witnessed a parade like this in person ever and I am not sure if I will ever do so again.




That same evening, we were back again to the square. Buses stopped at Forbidden City and we have a Long

walk to get back to the stands. Then, they put on one of the greatest fire-works displays that I have ever witnessed. It was not just fireworks. It was a spectacular event of singing and dancing performances by some of China's most famous stars. Each segment was followed by a fireworks show. In all there were 7 separate fireworks displays over 2 hours. It was again magnificent. With the night lighting across the square, it is amazing how all this could have been coordinated smoothly. Like everyone else, we were all busily taking photographs and videos during the parade. Like many people, the camera battery ran out. So we watched the awesome display. I can truly

say that everyone went away that evening greatly impressed.

Even though the trip was a short one for me, it was very memorable. It was a great honour to be invited. It was a chance to see China's progress and it was clearly on display. I look forward to many more visits to China and to see more of the country.

三十六计 - by Raymond Wong

The *Thirty-Six Stratagems* was a Chinese essay used to illustrate a series of <u>stratagems</u> used in politics, war, as well as in civil interaction, often through unorthodox or deceptive means.

第二计 围魏救赵

Second Stratagem: Besiege Wèi to rescue Zhào

共敌不如分敌,敌阳不如敌阴。

本指围攻魏国的都城以解救赵国。现借指用包超敌人的后方来迫使它撤兵的战术。

所谓围魏救赵,是指当敌人实力强大时,要避免和强敌正面决战,应该采取迂回战术,迫使敌人分散兵力,然后抓住敌人的薄弱环节发动攻击,致敌于死地。

[故事]:公元前 354 年,魏国军队围赵国都城<u>邯郸</u>,双方战守年余,赵衰魏疲。这时,<u>齐国应赵</u>国的求救,派<u>田忌</u>为将,<u>孙膑</u>为军师,率兵八万救赵。攻击方向选在哪里?起初,<u>田忌</u>准备直趋<u>邯郸。孙膑</u>认为,要解开纷乱的丝线,不能用手强拉硬扯,要排解别人打架,不能直接参与去打。派兵解围,要避实就虚,击中要害。他向<u>田忌</u>建议说,现在魏国精锐部队都集中在赵国,内部空虚,我们如带兵向魏国的国都大<u>梁</u>进军,魏军必然放下赵国回师自救,齐军乘其疲惫,

在预先选好的作战地区<u>桂陵</u>迎敌于归途,魏军大败,赵国之围遂解。孙膑用围攻魏国的办法来解救赵国的危困,这在中国历史上是一个很有名的战例,被后来的军事家们列为三十六计中的重要一计。围魏救赵这一避实就虚的战法为历代军事家所欣赏,至今仍有其生命力.

When the enemy is too strong to be attacked directly, then attack something he holds dear. Know that he cannot be superior in all things. Somewhere there is a gap in the armour, a weakness that can be attacked instead.

The origin of this proverb is from the <u>Warring States</u> <u>Period</u>. The state of <u>Wèi</u> attacked <u>Zhao</u> and laid siege to its capital <u>Handan</u>. <u>Zhào</u> turned to <u>Qí</u> for help, but the Qí general <u>Sun Bin</u> determined it would be unwise to meet the army of Wèi head on, so he instead attacked Wei's capital at <u>Daliang</u>. The army of Wèi retreated in haste, and the tired troops were ambushed and defeated at the <u>Battle of Guiling</u>, with the Wèi general <u>Pang Juan</u> slain on the field.

Once upon a time, there lived an old man and his son on the northern frontiers of China. They loved horses and always let their horses grazing everywhere.

One day, his servant reported that the one of the horses has disappeared and believed that it has run to the neighbouring nation.

Neighbours came to comfort the old man. But the old man was not at all upset. He said his loss might turn out to be a good thing. And he was right. A few months later, not only did his horse find its way back, it also brought with it another horse, one that was even better.

His neighbours came around again, this time to congratulate him on his gain. But again, the old man viewed the situation differently, and said that this "good luck" might bring about misfortune in the end.

Strangely, he was right again. A few days later, his son fell from the horse and broke his leg became a cripple. Everyone commiserated with the old man. "Perhaps this will soon turn out to be a blessing," said the father. A year later, the northern tribes started a big invasion of the border regions. All able-bodied young men took up arms and fought against the invaders, nine out of ten men died. The old man's son was not conscripted because of his disability and he survived.

However, although it does imply that bad luck can sometimes transform into good luck, the reverse is also true; good luck can sometimes give rise to bad.

The story of Yulanjie (盂兰节)

Yulanjie is celebrated on the 15th day of the 7th Lunar month. This is another festival associated with the full moon!

This festival has been celebrated for nearly two thousand years, since the Southern and Northern Dynasties (AD317-589). One reason for the festival to

endure such a long history is that it has its origin from Buddhism and Taoism (Daoism), and influence from Confucianism. Buddhism believes in afterlife and reincarnation. A person's afterlife is determined by the deeds in the worldly life. Taoism consider all things to have a god and deceased ancestors are among the deities. Confucianism advocates filial piety, honouring and respecting elders.

The name "Yulan" (盂兰)was derived from the Sanskrit word "Ullambana" - Buddhist Ghost Festival. As the Buddhist story goes, а monk named Mahāmaudgalyāyana (目連), who was one of Buddha Shakyamuni's chief disciples was known to be a clairvoyant. He was said to have supernormal powers which enabled him to transport himself from his body into the various realms of existence, and speaking with ghosts and gods. He often wondered what happened to his deceased parents in their afterlife. So he used his clairvoyance to see where they were and found that while his father was among the realm of the gods, his mother had been reborn into a lower realm and took on the form of a hungry ghost which has a thin throat in which no food could pass through. It was always hungry and had a fat belly. Mahāmaudgalyāyana was deeply upset. He tried to feed his mother but each time the food turned into fire as it got near her mouth. The Buddha instructed Mahāmaudgalyāyana to place food on a clean plate, performed certain ritual before offering the food. By doing so, his mother's hunger was relieved and through these merits, his mother was reborn as a Mahāmaudgalyāyana then sought Buddha's advice to help his mother gain a human rebirth. The Buddha was moved by this filial piety (孝) that he established a day after the traditional summer retreat (the 14th day of the seventh lunar month) on which Mahāmaudgalyāyana was to offer food and robes to Through monks. the merits created. Mahāmaudgalyāyana's mother finally gained a human birth.

Yulanjie is also known as zhongyuanjie (中元节).

In the Taoist calendar, there are three major events all happening on the 15th day of the month when the moon is full ($\Xi\bar{\pi}$). The 15th day of the first lunar month is known as shangyuan ($\pm\bar{\pi}$). Ceremonies are performed on this day to give blessing to all people. The 15th day of the seventh month is known as zhongyuan ($\pm\bar{\pi}$). Taoist priests and Buddhist monks perform ceremonies to relief sufferings of the deceased. On the 15th day of the tenth month, which is called xiayuan ($\pm\bar{\pi}$), ceremonies are performed to deflect bad luck for those who have faltered.

In the evening of Yulanjie incense is burnt in front of each household to welcome the visiting spirits of the ancestors to their homes for it is believed that during zhongyuan, the realms of the underworld and living are open and the deceased are able to visit their living families. Offerings are also made to unknown, wandering ghosts so that these homeless souls do not intrude on their lives and bring misfortune and bad luck. A large feast is held with samplings of food to appease the ghosts and ward off bad luck. Fourteen days after the festival, to make sure all the hungry ghosts find their way back to the other world, lanterns in the shape of lotus flowers are set off on paper boats. The light in the lanterns directs the ghosts back to the other world. When the light goes out, it symbolizes that they have found their way back.

Due to the influence of Confucius teachings, the offerings became directed towards ancestors rather than the monks and ancestor worship has replaced the simple ritual of relieving the hunger of the ghosts. However, in many places offerings and rituals are still performed for the hungry ghosts. For these reasons the festival is sometimes known as the Festival of the Hungry Ghosts.

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


